- **b.** How does he act around other people? You can use the following frame grabs for inspiration:





3. Actantial model



5. Theme and message

- d. Should his mother have acted differently?
- e. How can Mike break this vicious cycle?

Apply suitable <u>cinematic terms</u> to the frame grabs below, describing the function of the images in the film. Create your own narrative model, using these images.


