1. Summarise the film's plot

Work in groups of four.

- a. Person 1 gives a summary of the first part of the film
- b. Person 2 rephrases what Person 1 just said, as far as possible using different words. Next, Person 2 summarises a bit more of the film.
- c. Person 3 rephrases what Person 2 just said, as far as possible using different words. Next, Person 3 summarises a bit more of the film.
- d. Person 4 rephrases what Person 3 just said, as far as possible using different words. Finally, Person 4 summarises the rest of the film.

2. Setting and environment

Describe the film's physical [setting](#) and social environment. Discuss how the characters live, look, behave and speak. Use as many adjectives as possible. Find specific examples from the film to support your statements. You can use the below image for your description.

- f. What does it add to the story that there is a child in either group?



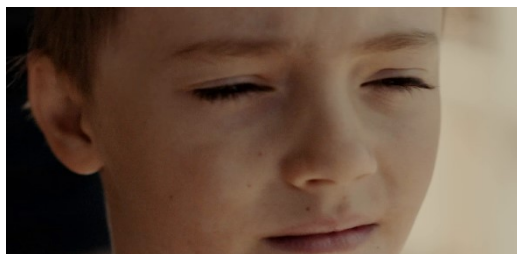
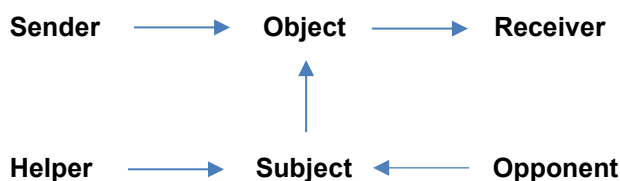

- Look up the meaning of *allegory*. Argue either for or against the use of allegory in the film.

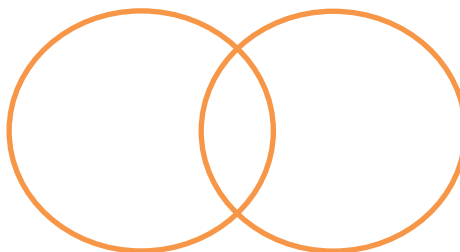
6. Theme and message

7. Context

The director, Guy Nattiv, made a feature film in 2019 of the same name, with the same actress, Danielle Macdonald, and the same general theme. In the right circle, write down all the elements that are unique to the short film. In the left circle, write down all the elements that are unique to the feature. Where the two circles overlap, write down what the two films have in common.



8. Discussion:

In groups of four, stand up and debate the following statements as described:

Speaker 1: **Point 1, Round 1:** Argue that the African-Americans tattoo Jeff black, so he can experience what it is like have dark skin. **Point 2, Round 2:** Argue that had Jeff not been shot, he would have learned not to be a racist.

Speaker 2: Disprove Speaker 1's point and make your own point in response.

Speaker 3: Disprove Speaker 2's point and make your own point in response.

Speaker 4: Disprove Speaker 3's point and make your own point in response.

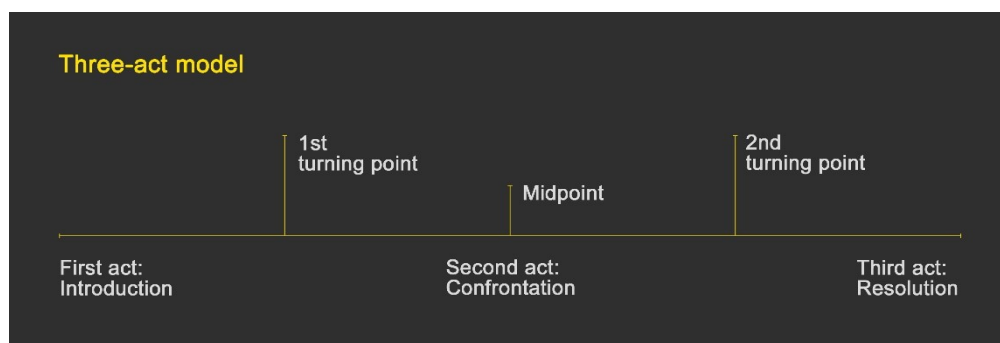

12. Contextual grammar

The below is an excerpt from a review of the film. There are six grammatical errors. Find and correct them.

Jamie Bells tough performance carry this forthright, earnest ... drama based on the true story of a far-right American skinhead called Bryon Widner and his attempts to leave a neo-Nazi white-power cult. This involved the agonisingly removal of his grotesque facial tattoos with their various Hitlerian symbols and fantasy nordic insignia. It's a vivid metaphor for the denazification process.

The film is being written and directed by Israeli-born film-maker Guy Nattiv.
